

# The Church as God's Agent in Evangelism and Missions

## Pre-Session Assignments

One week before the session, students will take the following assignments.

### Assignment One

Read John 20:21. The resurrected Jesus was with His disciples, and He was preparing them for the future. Prepare to share your answers to the following question: What were the two points Jesus emphasized in this verse?

### Assignment Two

Read 1 Corinthians 12:12–14. Paul said the church is like a body, meaning that each person has a special place in that body, both in who they are and what they do. Prepare to share your answers to the following question: Other than the pastor, what are three roles people have in the church?

### Assignment Three

Read Romans 10:13–15. This passage presents some of the chronological steps that lead to people being saved. Prepare to share your answers to the following question: What are these steps?

### Scripture to Memorize

*"How will they preach unless they are sent?"* Romans 10:15

### Session Goal

Consistent with God's Word and in the power of the Holy Spirit—by the end of this session, disciples will understand that evangelism and missions are done through the church.

## It's in the Book

30 minutes

### Real-Life Scenario

Two married couples sense a call to international missions. David and Amy attend Christian events but are not really connected to a church in their community. They decide on their own what country they want to go to. They use social media funding sites to raise money to live on. A few friends pray for them at the airport, but after that they are on their own.

Ralph and Jill actively serve in evangelism and ministry through their local church. Those they serve beside have joined them in months of prayer as they sought God's specific call. The pastor has helped Ralph and Jill connect with their denomination's international mission board, so their funding will not be a worry. The full church commissions them and prays over them when it is time to leave the U.S. Later, frequent communications between the couple and the congregation ensure continuing prayer.

Which couple seems to have a better opportunity to prosper across decades of international missions?

The last words of Jesus to His disciples are that we should go throughout the world and make disciples. Missions and evangelism are thus at the core of a disciple's identity. This raises the question, What and how do we do this?

### Assignment One Feedback

The student who completed **Assignment One** during the week may now share answers to the following question: What were the two points Jesus emphasized in John 20:21?

We have a tendency to see missions and evangelism as being performed by professionally trained individuals while the rest of us sit back and watch. The Bible, however, speaks of Christians living together as a *body* with each person having a role to play.

### Assignment Two Feedback

The student who completed **Assignment Two** during the week may now share three or more roles people have in the church.

We can learn how to do missions and evangelism by looking at the church in Antioch in the passages below.

**Read** Acts 13:1–5 out loud.

Antioch was a city in northern Syria, a long journey from Jerusalem. Acts 13:1 tells us that there was a church there, with prophets and teachers. Where could this church have come from? See Acts 11:19–26.

This church in Antioch launched Paul and Barnabas on their missionary journey. The details of this launch have implications for the church today.

### Studying the Passage, Acts 13:2–5

**Verse 2. While they were ministering.** This verse shows how the Lord calls people to missions while they are active in the church. In other words, Paul and Barnabas did not just sit around

waiting for something “big” to happen. The most likely way to hear a major call concerning the future is to be actively serving in the church today.

In Matthew 25:14–30, Jesus told His disciples the parable of the talents. The disciples learned that as Christians we are responsible to build His kingdom in accordance with how each of us has been gifted.

### **Discussion Questions**

Do you believe teenage believers are only the church of tomorrow or also the church of today? Would you say it is common in your church for teenagers to serve alongside adults in ministries such as the Sunday morning choir or praise team? the sound operators on Sunday morning? those making outreach visits? those providing practical help for the poor or homeless?

What could teenagers do to make it more likely that adults and teenagers serve side by side?

**Verse 2. the Holy Spirit said.** God is the one who calls, not a guilty conscience, or a sense of adventure, or even a well-meaning parent. We must hear *His* voice.

**Verse 3. fasted and prayed.** Paul and Barnabas took the call seriously and spent time with the Lord. **laid their hands.** This phrase refers to a public acknowledgment and blessing. **sent them.** The church took the initiative and responsibility for sending out the missionaries.

**Verses 4–5. they went down . . . they began to proclaim the word of God.** This was not just one gifted individual but God’s people working together.

### **Assignment Three Feedback**

The student who completed **Assignment Three** during the week may now share the chronological steps to salvation found in Romans 10:13–15.

### **On Your Own**

The chronological process begins with the church *sending*. The launch for Paul and his companions going out on a grand missionary journey was the *sending* of the Antioch church.

In the space below, write answers to these questions.

How can you and the other teenage disciples influence your church to be a missionary-sending congregation?

What is a new way you can be involved in the ministry and outreach of your church now, so you can be more prepared for future callings from the Holy Spirit?

Is your heart open to the possibility that Jesus might lead your church to send *you* out on a missions adventure, either short-term or all your life?

### **Heart and Hands**

8 minutes

Read again the **Real-Life Scenario** near the beginning of the lesson. Consider whether your answers have changed during the session.

Be silent for two or three minutes. Thank Jesus for His sacrifice and for the gospel. Adore Him for His glorious reign on the throne of heaven.

Then ask the Holy Spirit to reveal to you:

1. A way the Scriptures you studied today will change your heart (the real you) for the glory of Christ.
2. Or a way those Scriptures will lead you to stop doing something in your life for the glory of Christ.
3. Or a way those Scriptures will lead you to do something for the glory of Christ.

Write what the Spirit says to you below and then be ready to share what you have written with the group.

### **Since Last Week**

5 minutes

Give the group this update: "In our last session I made a commitment to. . . . I want to let you know how that turned out. On that same issue I think the Holy Spirit now is leading me to . . ."

### **Grace-Filled Accountability**

5 minutes

Disciples can agree on a way to hold one another accountable. Confessing faults with other disciples allows them to offer grace, insights, and encouragement. Even more important is confession to Christ, the source of true forgiveness and cleansing.

### **Planning for Evangelism, Missions, and Service**

5 minutes

Groups of disciples always are making preparations for evangelism, missions, and service. Use these minutes to work on the next plan.

### **Prayer**

7 minutes

Every disciple will pray aloud, offering praise to King Jesus, thanking Him specifically for His gracious acts, making heartfelt confession, committing to actions flowing from the Bible study, praying toward evangelism locally and globally, and interceding for others as prompted by the Holy Spirit.

## At Home: Nail It Down

God's kingdom grows throughout the world through missions and evangelism. Disciples must understand the sending base from which global missions and evangelism takes place.

The example of the church in Antioch in Acts 13:1–5 is a good place to start.

- In verse 2 we see that God's call to Paul and Barnabas was *through the church*.
- This call came *while they were ministering*, showing us that Christians in the church are to be actively involved in the life and ministry of the church.
- Verse 3 shows how the call to missions within the church was both spiritual, *having fasted and prayed*, and public, *laid hands on them*.
- In verses 4–5 we see that they fulfilled their ministry together as a team
  - *They went down.*
  - *They sailed.*
  - *They arrived.*
  - *They preached.*

This example of the church in Antioch shows us how missions and evangelism are not done in isolation by individuals but in and through the church, with each member actively playing his part.

### Parent Question

*What does the example of the church in Antioch teach about a call to missions and evangelism?*
