Pre-Session Assignments

One week before the session, students will take the following assignments.

Assignment One

List at least three general topics you think are important for your Christian life, such as the Holy Spirit or obedience. Then find at least two Scripture passages that discuss that topic, and write what the Bible teaches. Prepare to share your work with the group.

Assignment Two

Study Leviticus 16:31; Deuteronomy 8:2; Psalm 25:9; Isaiah 11:4; and Isaiah 61:1. Note how the topic of humility is addressed in each passage. Write the similarities and differences among the five passages. Prepare to share your work with the group.

Assignment Three

Study Luke 1:52; 2 Corinthians 7:6; Ephesians 4:2; Colossians 3:12; and James 4:6. Note how the topic of humility is addressed in each passage. Write the similarities and differences among the five passages. Prepare to share your work with the group.

Scripture to Memorize

“Do nothing from selfishness or empty conceit, but with humility of mind regard one another as more important than yourselves.” Philippians 2:3

Session Goal

Consistent with God’s Word and in the power of the Holy Spirit—by the end of this session, disciples will know the basic steps of a topical Bible study and will be able to apply that process to any number of issues.

It's in the Book

30 minutes

Real-Life Scenario

Have you ever been asked your perspective as a Christian on important issues such as dating, sports, death, or money? How did you respond? Were you able to refer to specific biblical passages and explain what God's Word says about that topic? Disciples who are living out their faith and engaging in evangelism are often questioned about important matters, and it's always good to be prepared with a biblical response. Learning how to do a topical Bible study prepares disciples to discover what the Bible says on any number of issues.

What Is a Topical Study?

Topical studies involve surveying what the whole Bible teaches about a particular theme or concept. This includes doctrinal or moral issues, family or work-related issues, or any other issue important to our culture or life in Christ. A topical Bible study includes the following steps:

1. Choose a topic.
2. List all related terms.
3. Identify specific Bible passages that contain these terms.
4. Look up relevant passages and identify the main point as it relates to the key terms.
5. Create a set of subtopics and group passages according to subtopics.
6. Consult a good Bible dictionary or encyclopedia to compare your findings.
7. Explain how some or all of the subtopics relate to one another or apply to the Christian life.

In general, topical studies require cross-referencing Scripture passages in order to integrate all relevant biblical passages. The key to topical Bible studies is being thorough in your investigation and precise in your analysis. Don't just study passages that fit one side or perspective, but look up all relevant Scriptures. To illustrate the process, we can apply this method to the topic of humility in Philippians 2:3.

Assignment One Feedback

The student who completed **Assignment One** during the week can now share a list of topics and passages that relate to that topic.

Discussion Question

What are some of the most important topics for young people to study today?

Choosing a Topic to Study

Read Philippians 2:3–5 out loud.

Studying the Passage, v. 3

Verse 3. Do nothing from selfishness or empty conceit, but with humility of mind regard one another as more important than yourselves. Paul instructed disciples to live humbly and look out for the interests of others. Let's assume you are studying Philippians and want to know more about what the Bible teaches on the topic of humility. The first step is to list all the terms related to humility, such as *humble*, *gentle*, *meek*, *poor*, *modest*, and *afflicted*. Some of the words will be in the immediate context, but this list may grow as you continue your study.

Assignment Three Feedback

The student who completed **Assignment Three** during the week can now share how several passages relate to the categories above.

The last step involves discovering how these subtopics relate to one another and to the life of a disciple. First, Moses and Christ provide living examples of humility. Philippians 2:5 presents Christ as the ultimate example of humility. Other passages teach that God wants His people to express humility before Him. Several other texts explain the benefits of living humbly. Finally, some passages call disciples to live humbly before God and others. This is where Philippians 2:3–5 fits. Humility calls disciples to look out for the interests of others rather than themselves.

Discussion Questions

What was the most challenging part of working through a topical study, and what is one thing you learned about humility by working through this process?

On Your Own

Choose one of the fruit of the Spirit or the works of the flesh listed in Galatians 5:19–23. In the space below, briefly describe the steps of a topical study for one of these topics.

Heart and Hands

8 minutes

Read again the **Real-Life Scenario** near the beginning of the lesson. Consider whether your answers have changed during the session.

Be silent for two or three minutes. Thank Jesus for His sacrifice and for the gospel. Adore Him for His glorious reign on the throne of heaven.

Then ask the Holy Spirit to reveal to you:

1. A way the Scriptures you studied today will change your heart (the real you) for the glory of Christ.
2. Or a way those Scriptures will lead you to stop doing something in your life for the glory of Christ.
3. Or a way those Scriptures will lead you to do something for the glory of Christ.

Write what the Spirit says to you below and then be ready to share what you have written with the group.

At Home: Nail It Down

A topical Bible study is a great way to discover what the Bible teaches on any given issue. Topical studies can address specific issues that are important to the people we see every day.

Topical studies involve a process of identifying, cross-referencing, and grouping Scripture passages that all address the same issue. At times this process can be challenging and overwhelming, especially if it is a large topic with lots of passages. But the outcome is always worth the effort since you will have a solid grounding in the way God's Word addresses key issues.

Take the time to memorize the steps of topical Bible study:

1. Choose a topic.
2. List all related terms.
3. List all passages related to these terms.
4. Summarize the main point related to the topic.
5. Group passages into subheadings.
6. Consult others and compare findings.
7. Apply findings to the Christian life.

Try applying this method to another topic in which you have special interest.

The key to this method is learning to be thorough and precise at the same time. Don't just look up passages that fit one side of an issue, but study all relevant Scriptures. The more you use this Bible study method, the more skillful you will become at using it. This is a great way to study the Bible and learn what the Bible has to say about the important issues of our day.
